FALL RIVER (Trout)

**Saturday, November 1st through
Tuesday, November 4th, 2014**

Overview of Outing:

As quoted from The Fly Shop's website on the Fall River: "October and November also don't get much attention from anglers, but have great hatches of tiny Tricos and Baetis mayflies, and larger Callibaetis mayflies, too. Trout will consistently feed on a variety of dry flies, nymphs, and even slowly swung wet flies or streamers throughout the course of a fishing day. Fall River regulars don't talk much about the fall season, mainly because they don't want everyone to know how good the fishing can be at that late time of year."

We stay at one of four well-appointed guesthouses at the Circle 7 Ranch. Cost is about \$90 per night, plus a shared boat rental of \$80 per day (two per boat). Meals are done as follows: group dinners, breakfast/lunch on your own.

We're limited to seven people and we now have five signed up. We will be asking for a deposit of \$50 from each attendee at the next club meeting to confirm our reservation with Circle 7. We will provide more detailed info as soon as we have the sign-up completed. Last year we went about one month earlier, and experienced the "fishing doldrums". Most of the reports right now say fair to good, but cooler weather in November should improve the picture. PUTAH CREEK TROUT

Saturday, October 4th, 2014

Overview of Outing:

We will be fishing from the bridge before the dam downstream at several of the fishing pullouts. First we will meet at 7:15 a.m. at the western side of the bridge parking area (dirt) up near the dam (directions below). I will be there at 7:10 a.m. in my gold Toyota 4runner and will distribute six flies (two of my Baetis emergers, two two-tone Zebra Midges, and two WD40's) and two strike indicators to each member that shows up. I will demonstrate how to set up a two fly Nymphing rig, before we head out in small groups to fish. Bring a 4-6 wt. 8-10 foot fly rod, 9 foot 4x leaders, 4x and 5x tippet materials and AB tin split shot. This is primarily a small nymphing stream, with the following recommended flies (this stream is now catch and release, so barbless hooks are in order) in order of importance based on my experience on the stream: Tan Fox's Pupa with copper bead heads (16/18), WD40's (olive and brown 18/20), Neon or Flashback Pheasant Tails (16/18/20), Mercer's Beadhead Micro Mayfly in olive (18/20), Yong Specials in brown and light olive (18/20), Red and Copper colored Copper Johns in (16/18) and Black Zebra Midges (18-22). If you are in the mood to swing flies, black and olive woolly buggers or Hale Bopp's in sizes 10 and 12 should do the trick.

Around 1 p.m., we can break for lunch at the roach coach in Winters (white truck on right side of road just east of the only light in town – going back towards freeway) for the best carnitas tacos and burritos you have ever had (\$5 for six tacos, or \$6 for Burritos Grande)! For those squeamish folks, this truck and the carnitas were in the *SF Chronicle* food section as "Best in the Bay" in past years and the food is great.

This outing should give you the basic skills needed to be successful on Putah, very close to home (1 hour) with Rainbows to 25" and occasional large browns. As an added incentive, I will provide a map of the creek (hard copy only and please do not put it on the internet) and an article on 90-degree nymphing.

Driving directions are: Take Interstate 80 towards Sacramento. On the other side of Vacaville, take the Interstate 505 north exit, then, when you reach Winters take the highway 128 exit for Winters due west. Continue on 128 through Winters towards Lake Berryessa until you cross over Putah Creek. As you cross the Bridge over Putah Creek make an immediate right into the large dirt parking area.

Summer Steelhead Fishing on the Deschutes River

On August 10th, DVFF club members, **Diane Morrell** and **Rich Bourdon**, along with Rich's son Logan, joined Chris O'Donnell (River Runner Outfitters) for a four-day drift-boat camp trip on the Deschutes to swing flies for the summer steelhead run.

Oregon's Lower Deschutes River flows about 100 miles from Pelton Dam to its confluence with the Columbia River. The Deschutes is largely spring fed and provides a nutrient rich habitat for a healthy population of native rainbow trout (redsides) and a summer steelhead run – one of the best in the world. The Lower Deschutes carves a spectacular basalt canyon through the rugged and arid Central Oregon high desert, at times over 1,000 feet deep. The canyon is rich in wildlife, geological and cultural history. Many class II, III, and IV whitewater rapids add an extra thrill to the experience. Each day we floated and fished a new stretch of river down stream. In August, the steelhead are migrating up river, giving us a distinct advantage when searching for those elusive pods of fish the lower river is known for.

Deschutes River steelhead are famous for taking swung flies on or near the surface. Using spey rods, our approach was to swing flies with floating lines. Fishing with floating lines is best during low light and periods of indirect sunlight during early mornings and evenings. Each day Chris would position us in water where the sun wasn't shining directly in the steelhead's eyes.

Three anglers fit comfortably aboard "Joe", our McKenzie style drift boat. Chris decided to guide us without the support of a second boat. This allowed us to move along the river at a pace that the fishing dictated, allowing us to be flexible to choose the best runs and camps along the river instead of being required to have a preplanned destination for camping each night.

Day one was a long day of fishing. Small classic steelhead flies (Silver Hilton type) were the ticket. At the first run of



the day Diane landed the first steelhead of the trip. A beautiful wild hen weighing in at approximately 7 lbs. The middle of the day afforded us a shady spot for a nice BBQ cheeseburger lunch and a rest (nap for the guys) on comfy cots, while Diane and Chris ventured across the river to an island to try for trout. This adventure turned into a swim that will not be soon forgotten. The water was refreshing as the temps were getting quite hot (90's). That evening, Chris put us on a great chute where Logan fished first, landing his first fish of the trip – a beautiful wild male (below, left). The fish was slow to come to hand and gave a great fight. Diane was second to fish the run and hooked into a large hatchery male (above). "This is why I came out here, all my time in is finally paying off," Diane said.

The second day the temps soared into the high 90s or low 100s. The hot dry air and sunny skies made us anglers move a little slower and the fish apparently a little deeper. Only one steelhead was landed, but Rich got a trout and a couple of whitefish to hand. Chris gave us all casting instruction during the mid-day lull in fishing, also explaining the intricacies of landing steelhead without assistance of a guide or a net. The water we were fishing was called "Duck Box," a 200-300 yard long classic steelhead run, where we could spread out and all fish at once. Diane had the opportunity to land her first steelhead on her own during the evening fishing session. We were all very comfortable sleeping out under the stars the first two nights; the only problem was that the "super moon" made the camp very bright. The next morning we fished the same run in different positions. Rich landed a nice wild hen right in front of camp.

Day three was perfect conditions. In the morning we fished a few runs and after a short drift, we chose very nice camp spot with lots of shade and room for tents. The day was turning cloudy, which meant that the fishing was good



ALL AFTERNOON. Poised on another great run with plenty of room for us all to fish at once, we headed out. Each of us landed fish, with Rich wrestling in the “steelhead of a lifetime.” “It was a hatchery buck, 34” long, 15-16 lbs. More than likely an Idaho B Fish (went up the cooler Deschutes River rather than the warmer Columbia). I caught him around 8:00 a.m. and landed him about 20-25 minutes later. Too bad no one was around to see the fight or the fish which is the biggest fish I’ve ever caught on a fly,” Rich recalled. “That’s the fish I’ve been looking for in here,” said Chris, congratulating Rich on his catch. Homemade vegetable curry with fresh butternut squash and loads of veggies and a nice bottle of red wine warmed us up after the afternoon rain. The weather in the canyon changed so drastically we were chilly after fishing but our tents were warm, dry and comfortable. Evening camp was fun and relaxing and we had an excellent run to fish in the morning right at camp. We all rested very well without the heat.

We covered a lot of ground on the last day, stopping at many classic lower Deschutes runs like “bedsprings” and “wagon blast,” plus lots of rapids that were plenty of fun in the drift boat. Diane switched to a sink tip and was wading deep into the runs and had huge success, hooking four large fish before noon. After several previous steelhead trips yielded no success, Diane credits her success (nine hooked/seven landed) simply to “putting in the time – I was due – I had at least 3,000 casts under my belt with no fish to hand. And of course, four days of swinging flies with the an excellent guide/instructor like Chris by my side, helped to up the anti.”

Chris proved to be an excellent chef as well as guide. Dinners consisted of fresh large prawns sautéed with garlic, kale salad and hot garlic bread, salmon the second night, and freshly made veggie curry the last night. The incredible meals and growing friendships were an added bonus to the trip. “Chris O’Donnell was a wonderful guide and teacher,” said Rich. “I have nothing but respect for all the hard work he did to make our four-day trip a great success. I definitely would recommend this trip to anyone who loves fishing and incredible scenery.”

All in all, the trip was amazing. If you are interested in joining Diane and **Karen Kaiser** on 4-day float trip on the middle section of the Deschutes (Trout Creek to Maupin) October 4-7, we have four spots open. Steelhead run this section by mid September and this combination trout and steelhead fly fishing trip is perfect for indicator nymphing riffles and pocket water which will result in some beautiful rainbow trout, some resident and others large migrants from the Pacific Ocean. Conservation Corner

Mines vs Fish For those of you who have followed the saga of the Pebble Mine above Bristol Bay, Alaska, it probably came as some relief to learn that the

U.S., EPA had entered the fray, called in by conservation and other groups to insert the Clean Water act into the process. A troubling event just occurred, however, that may help propel the decision process to a fish-favorable conclusion. High up in the headwaters of the British Columbia’s Fraser River is a mine similar to the proposed Pebble Mine. So similar, in fact, that the Pebble folks had pointed to it as an example of how mining and fish could co-exist in a wilderness. But that was before a major breach of its tailings pond occurred on August 4th, sending millions of gallons of contaminated water and sediment into the Fraser’s headwaters. As you might imagine, the Pebble boosters are distancing themselves from this incident, and the Save Bristol Bay advocates are making sure everyone knows about it.

But that’s way up in BC and Alaska, and nothing like that could happen in California, right? Unfortunately, that’s not the case. In an Oregon wilderness area at the headwaters of our beloved Smith River, a London firm has asked the USFS for exploratory drilling permits. The firm already has claims in the area, and will likely pursue a plan to extract nickel via a strip mine. 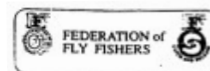
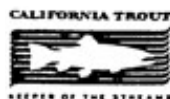
